





Rules:

- 1. Students are either put into groups or create their own. The size of the groups is the teacher's discretion. Group names can be made by the group or assigned by the teacher.
- 2. There will be 5 rounds where students can get points.

 They must work together to answer the questions. No cell phones or computers. Using technology is a elimination from the round.
- 3. All rounds except the "Who am I?" round can be doubled down. Double down is if the group thinks they have all the answers right. If they double down they get double points. If they get any question wrong, they lose all the points.

4. "Who am I":

- a. The teacher will ask 8 questions about an artist. They will begin with question one. The questions start off broad and become more specific.
- b. After each question, groups will get a chance to answer. Each group can answer each round once until they get it right.
- c. If a group gets the answer after the first question, they get 8 points, second question they get 7 points, and so on.
- 5. After the 5 rounds, the group with the most points win.
